The students continue to enjoy their field trip in the business world, their ADA excursions, and lived experiences as high notes in the course. My guest speakers both locally and internationally bring added value to the material. They are a great way to break up the weekly grind.



Many of you may recall my work with my fellow wheelchair buddies. We formed the Wheelchair Highwaymen group. Our pictures have been on display at the Florida State Capitol, the FSU Fine Arts Department, and this abstract picture made the cover of the Florida Disability Rights Annual Report.

I am starting my 15th year as a member of the Delta Disabilities Advisory Board. I am one of the longest-serving members of the board. Nevertheless, I am most excited about how we have helped Delta





become a leader in air travel for persons with disabilities. It was super cool to be one of their "guinea pigs" on their new innovative seat that will allow PWDs to fly sitting in their mobility device rather than having to be picked up and transferred into a "regular seat". For those of you who missed the news clips, here is a link to the <u>prototype chair</u>. We are also working on accessible in-flight entertainment and accessible bathrooms. All good stuff. It was a pleasure to collaborate with my colleague, Mina, on this prototype. One of the challenges was to make it fit all user sizes. As you can see on the left, one size does not fit all.

The local newspaper and my friends at Different Brains have been equally supportive of my advocacy and messaging. This included a few Letters to the Editor: one on EVs, one on Rish Park, and another on the 33rd anniversary of the ADA. The Different Brains organization highlighted travel and international travel for persons with disabilities in their podcast episode. I have a bill in the legislature this year called HB55. Its purpose is to provide spousal benefit upon my departure from the natural world. Florida gave spouses of first responders and veterans with disabilities a property tax benefit. But, quadriplegics were accidentally left out. Any of my Florida friends should feel free to their Florida legislators and say that this bill is a good policy. If it passes, it will have to go on the ballot as well.

My student Group, University of Choice, hosted its 8th annual speaker series. They brought in Chris Ruffin. He is an Emmy Award-winning News Producer from Memphis. We had a nice chat about living and thriving with a disability. His challenge is Sickle Cell...which has some unique issues and I was uninformed before his arrival.

HOME:

Earlier this year, I reported some chronic pain; I am pleased to share that it has passed! The cause of this discomfort was my seating and wheelchair cushion. Apparently, 40 years of living with Quadriplegia has resulted in significant atrophy in the buttocks area--not enough cushion on the backside anymore. Many of you may remember the flap surgery back in 2018...Cannot and will not undergo that experience again.

Team JR is doing well, but a number of the guys will graduate in the spring of 2024. Thus, the recruiting process is never-ending. I did have the pleasure of seeing three different PCAs over one of the football weekends. One was from 1996, another from 2010, and the last from the present! It was kind of cool ©. I always enjoy bowling with my teams as well. Of course, the old guy got the high score with a 154 on 2/3 games. With extra practice, I might be able to beat my personal best of 179. I believe bowling is a new Paralympic sport this summer,



should be interesting to watch and see the best quads consistently break 220.

Another accessible and fun pastime is miniature golf. <u>Sloppy play</u> on a miniature golf course, helps me stay competitive against my PCAs. Thanks to my friends at the University of Pittsburg, I have a new adaptive putter, which should make me more competitive/consistent on the greens. We did have a hurricane this past August. It was not as bad as the 2018 Michael, but it did some damage.
